


There are many different teachers who have uploaded summaries and support on youtube to help revise plot and content. We recommend Mr Bruff.



If further support is required, we recommend the York Notes revision guides for each text. You may be able to get these from a local library or pick them up second hand on marketplace sites.



Pupils can use the Revision and Exam Practice to make notes from and write up any questions, whereas the workbook is a place to try out questions and there are answers in the back.



Understanding the plot and content



Clear information:

The text that is being studied.

A quotation from the text.

Where in the text is that quote from?

Why is that quote important?

What does the quote convey about the author's intentions?



Example of useful English flash cards



Provides the key texts that we study and instant feedback on their knowledge.

Each quiz contains 15 questions, and they will have 15 seconds to answer each question.



The right calculator is so important



Be well equipped and practice with the correct equipment for each question

Actually engaging in Questions is far better and more effective than just reading and passive revision

Show all working – if you don't, it could cost you method marks in every question

Practice with the actual calculator you will use in the exam – familiarity and confidence is key

Use your homework and Question Level Analysis to inform your revision planning – don't avoid difficult topics

Quick bursts followed by a break is more effective

Use the Sparx as much as possible (10 minutes every day) when it comes online in the next couple of weeks

Hints and Tips



The key to be successful in maths is to do maths

The best way to do this is to complete independent work on Sparx maths

Each week you have 1 hour of homework on sparx maths to complete, but you should also aim to do 10 minutes of independent practice every day



 Landfall on the south coast of the USA New Orleans

Preparation

- Very good forecasting, tracking & monitoring enabled prediction of where the hurricane would make landfall.


 Mayor of New Orleans ordered evacuation 80% successfully. However, many people were unable to leave and some chose to stay at
- Superdome, was designated as a shelter
- superdome, was designated as a shelter

 Storm surge overwhelmed levees and barriers (they had not been properly maintained or upgraded).
- Areas e.g. Ninth Ward deep water people had to escape to their roofs to avoid the water.

Response

- esponse of local/national governments has been criticized not being fast enough or effective enough.
- Superdome had very limited supplies e.g. food/water
- The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) were unprepared for the scale of destruction and there were many more people needing help than FEMA could cope with.
- Those worst affected poorest regions of the city. These were the people without cars, which made it harder for them to evacuate.
 Survivors from these areas felt betrayed by their government.






